As your dedicated fire service professionals, we're bringing an urgent issue to your attention: California's local fire agencies, including your own, face a critical funding crisis jeopardizing public safety statewide.

For 50 years, demands on fire districts have dramatically increased. Our roles have expanded beyond fire suppression to include sophisticated emergency medical services (EMS), hazardous materials incidents, technical rescues, and extensive wildfire mitigation. These responsibilities require continuous training, advanced equipment, and adequate staffing.

Understanding Our Funding Challenge: It's vital to understand how local fire districts operate and are funded, especially compared to state agencies like CalFire. While CalFire is a state agency primarily focused on wildland fire protection in State Responsibility Areas, your local fire district provides allrisk emergency services directly to your community every day. Our primary funding comes heavily from property taxes and service fees. Unfortunately, these funding mechanisms have not kept pace; our property tax allocations have remained stagnant since the 1970s. This gap leads to challenging choices, including potential brownouts, increased response times, and deferred investments in vital equipment and infrastructure.

Why Local Matters to the State (and CalFire): This isn't just about our local district; it impacts the entire state. Your fire district is crucial to California's statewide mutual aid system. While CalFire is instrumental in fighting large wildfires, they rely heavily on resources from local fire agencies. During recent fires, over 60% of personnel came from local agencies. Forty-two percent of fire engines deployed on the line come from local government agencies, underscoring our vital role in statewide wildfire response. When local agencies are underfunded, it strains this system, putting more communities at risk. In 2020, California saw nearly 20,000 "Unable to Fill" calls for additional fire resources, highlighting a breakdown in local operational capacity.

The direct impact: potentially longer response times, units temporarily taken out of service ("brownouts"), and a strained mutual aid system.

The Indispensable Role of Local Fire Agencies: This funding crisis isn't just a "fire department problem"; it's a community problem. Delays in emergency response can have devastating consequences for individuals and significant economic impacts. Local fire agencies are absolutely vital to the state's entire emergency response, including supporting CalFire. When CalFire needs additional resources for large incidents, they heavily depend on manpower and engines from local fire districts. Local agencies provide over 60% of personnel during major fires. This reliance means that underfunded local agencies lead to critical "Unable to Fill" (UTF) requests for mutual aid, impacting statewide capacity.

It's time to advocate for those who protect us. We need our state legislators to prioritize sustainable funding for local fire services. Investing in local fire districts is an investment in our collective safety and economic resilience.
